She's a politician with a difference

For those who believe the stereotype that politicians don't like to get their hands dirty, meet Rafah Dicostanzo, MLA, Clayton Park W., in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada. After hearing a constituent's ideas for stemming litter's tide, she dove into the issue. Her hands-on approach includes active participation in a cleanup group, talking to people about litter and challenging other parts of the province to best her area's efforts. The goal Dicostanzo has is to make her jurisdiction the cleanest in the entire province. To that end, she's looking to form a litter committee to advise on further measures to curb the behaviour.

Philadelphia fines are up 300 per cent

Stepped-up enforcement hasn't made the hoped-for dent in Philadelphia's littering problem, according to analysis by billypenn.com. An increase in tickets issued over the past decade - 7,000 in 2009 to about 20,000 last year - hasn't abated the city's litter problem, and North Gratz Street residents feel enforcement is unfairly targeted on them.

Plastic bag use falling in China

A Chinese government report says the nation is using 66 per cent fewer plastic bags in supermarkets today than one year ago. A bag ban last June and other measures since 2008 have helped the Chinese avoid the use of 40 billion bags and 1.6 million tons of petroleum.

South Carolina shores face unusual threat (8/5) Every major beachfront resort in Hilton Head Island, SC was contacted by the town about unusual piles of litter posing hazards to wildlife: abandoned hotel towels. 'Love your streets, no butts' the message here (8/3) A personal pocket-shaped ashtray bearing the label "park your butt here" is the reward to smokers who discard their cigarette butts responsibly in a container in a new campaign in Cheshire West and Chester, UK. Scurrying to clean up after inmates axed (8/7) To save money, Walker County, AL wound up its inmate work release program, including its litter-picking crews. The corrections board is now looking at how best to address what one commissioner describes as a littering "epidemic." Fireworks enter a North Dakota courtroom (8/9) It rarely happens, but a court in Minot, ND accepted a man's plea of guilty of littering for his use of fireworks.
