## India backpedals on ban

Spooked by the prospect of job losses, the Indian government has backed away from its ban on single use plastic items that was to have begun on Oct. 2. Unemployment in India sits at 45 per cent. Warnings from industry about the ban's negative economic impact prompted a go-slower approach. The ban on things like plastic bags, straws, plates, cups and small bottles has been put off until at least 2022.

### New Zealand study a shocker

Cigarette butts, comprise a whopping 80 per cent of all litter in New Zealand, a new study has revealed. The five-month, government-supported study, led by Keep New Zealand Beautiful, pegged the number of littered, toxic butts at 10 billion nationwide. That equals 2,142 per resident. Half the butts were found within 5 meters of a bin. The high proportion of tobacco litter took researchers by surprise.

#### Straws on request in LA

Los Angeles has ordered restaurants to give out a plastic straw only when a customer requests one. A new law adopted on Earth Day sprang into full force Tuesday as the coastal city strives to reduce the risk of straws entering the environment. Plastic straws rank in the top ten of the world's most littered items, The Straws on Request program, initiated by Councilman Mitch O'Farrell, had been piloted in eateries with 26 or more employees. Now it applies across the board and establishments are adjusting by using paper straws, for example. Some customers bring their own, reusable straws.

#### DID YOU KNOW?

A multipronged <u>plan</u> to keep the city clean is percolating in Oswego, NY, and the mayor is its champion. Included in the plan: banning smoking, vaping and tobacco use on all city property and events; doubling the local fine for litter from \$100 to \$200; banning the sale and use of polystyrene within city limits; doubling the number of trash cans in city parks and downtown; and, supporting the statewide plastic bag ban with "Keep Oswego Clean" reusable tote bags.
