Edmonton kits keep the spirit alive

Edmonton, Alberta, Canada is catering to cleanup keeners despite the COVID-19 pandemic curtailing the city's usual large-scale group events. Litter kits, pictured above, were distributed - five apiece - to the city's 160 non-profit community leagues, which represent residents and neighbourhood associations across the capital. Kits are replenished as demand dictates. They include

grabbers, gloves, bags and a pamphlet of safety tips. Volunteers are encouraged to clean up while abiding by health and hygiene rules.

ALBERTA HEALTH SERVICES CLEAN UP GUIDELINES:

- MAINTAIN A PHYSICAL DISTANCING OF TWO METRES (SIX FEET) OR MORE FROM OTHERS
- WEAR GLOVES
- DISINFECT THE LITTER GRABBER OR ANY OTHER TOOL USED BEFORE AND AFTER USE
- SECURE AND DISPOSE OF ALL LITTER AND GARBAGE BAGS IN APPROPRIATE DISPOSAL LOCATIONS
- WASH HANDS REGULARLY WITH SOAP AND WATER OR HAND SANITIZER

Virus sidelines Ontario's big plans

The first Litter Day of Action in Canada's largest province, Ontario, is said to be going ahead on May 12. However, a government aide this week confirmed that all community and corporate cleanup events across the province have been postponed until Waste Reduction Week, which will take place October 19-25. A spokesperson for the Minister of Environment, Conservation and Parks told Litterland that this year's inaugural effort "will focus on an awareness campaign highlighting impacts and actions of waste in the environment, and what actions each and every Ontarian can take to prevent, reduce and divert waste, right at home." But in our view little planning had occurred prior to the coronavirus hitting. Event details and media materials were consistently unavailable. This first day of action "is just the beginning of 365 days of action that Ontarians can take to make our communities and our province a cleaner, healthier place to live, work and grow," press secretary Andrew Buttigleg said in an email.
