Fix potholes or pick up litter?

Reacting to a television news story, Ohio's Department of Transportation spent two days last week removing littered disposable face masks from the shoulders of Highway I-90. The occasion allowed an official to ask, "Would you rather us fill potholes or pick up trash?" Described as a "huge problem" in Ohio, litter picking interferes with necessary work like road and bridge repairs. Crews fill 40,000 bags, devote 26,000 hours at a cost of \$4 million a year in District 12 (Cleveland) alone, one of 16 state districts.
