The giant rainbow arc is Brighton's way of reminding visitors to behave. On view until September 14, the sculpture comes courtesy of the Every Can Counts recycling initiative.

Gloves are off in this fight

Masks and gloves (PPE) continue to amass in disturbing numbers. An estimated 130 billion face masks and 65 billion plastic gloves are being thrown away globally each month during the COVID-19 pandemic. Keep America Beautiful says proper PPE disposal is an urgent priority. Kalamazoo, Michigan is staging a cleanup dedicated to picking up used masks that wearers have thoughtlessly strewn. Tofino, BC has responded to the PPE littering crisis by raising fines to \$200. Lake Como, NJ is posting blue and white reminder signs everywhere. The council in Warrington, UK put out a press release.

Canada committed to ban: MP

COVID-19 has slowed but has not completely erased the timetable for Canada's ban on certain single use plastic items, Litterland has learned. "Our government remains committed to banning harmful single-use plastics as warranted and based on science," said MP Shaun Chen in an email. "The development of any regulatory measures, including which items are good candidates for a ban, will be informed by science and socio-economic considerations. As the pandemic has disrupted business as usual for nearly all Canadians, our government's consultations with Canadians and stakeholders will take place when appropriate or when operations return to normal. Originally the plan was to have a ban in place by July 2021. The government has yet to specify which items will be subject to the ban.

Paddle board makes waves over lake litter (08/25) Rochelle Carnegie, founder of Ontario-based group A Greener Future completed her 18-day, 430 km solo trip from Niagara-on-the-Lake to Kingston on a paddle board, removing litter and raising awareness about lake pollution along the way. She was 92 hours on the water.

Ajax making some welcome moves (8/26) East of Toronto in Ajax, Ontario a deal has been sealed with a private company for 31 new, improved street bins at no cost in exchange for advertising rights. Council

recently tightened its littering and dumping laws too.

Fiji sewer system in trouble due to litter (8/27) Littering is gumming up the sewer works in Lautoka, Fiji. Deliberate dumping of waste into drains is causing overflows and blockages that necessitate costly repairs.

Food packagers onboard nationwide petition (8/27) Don't Trash Our Future, a concerted petition drive from Clean Up Britain and news concern inyourarea.co.uk, has official backing from the nation's food packaging industry. Seeking £1,000 fines and guaranteed litter enforcement, the petition's goal is to secure enough signatures to get Parliament to debate it and vote.
