#### Utility bill boo-boo exposed

An estimated 60,000 Toronto households were mailed waste and water bills containing a leaflet that should have included a litter reminder but didn't, *Litterland* has discovered. Those utility customers received a winter version end-May that, among other details like

fees, explains how to prevent frozen pipes and position waste bins on snow banks. The city blames the company it contracts to print tax, utility bills and the insert. The printer had to downscale operations due to COVID-19, ran behind schedule and then had to delay producing the spring/ summer leaflet to get tax bills printed. A correct brochure started going out last week to the remaining 460,000 utility account holders, a city spokesperson said.



#### Excellent recycling calendar kyboshed

Toronto's beloved Waste Collection Calendar has been scrapped. Instead, a 2022 schedule will be inserted in the utility bill. Residents are asked to "watch out for it and hold onto it." A Waste Management Guide with information on how to properly sort and reduce waste will also be mailed to homes by the end of the year.

# **Sculpture greets G7 brass**

Mount Recyclemore, a giant sculpture of G7 leaders' busts made out of discarded electronics by artist Joe Rush, was installed to greet them in Sandy Acres near the site of their meeting in Carbis Bay, Cornwall to draw attention and action to a global e-waste problem. The six-week project involving 15 artists came together with support from musicMagpie, a UK electronics recycler.

#### Police target kids in Operation Freeze (6/9)

Ontario Provincial Police will be watching this summer for kids exhibiting good behaviours such as picking up litter. Officers will issue "positive tickets", redeemable for a free frosty treat from Circle K convenience stores. Canada's 2020 "Dirty Dozen" identified (6/9) Canada's top twelve littered items list from the Great Canadian Shoreline Cleanup notes a near doubling in single use food/drink items, and PPE for the first time. Tennessee takes on the daunting challenge (6/10) Tennessee Wildlife Federation and its litter-fighting Tennessee CLEAN arm are hailing the state's decision to do the major litter study they've been urging as the state confronts 100 million pieces of new litter on its highways in a year.
